Total Solar Eclipse ~ August 21, 2017

On Monday, Aug. 21, 2017, the U.S. will be treated to a total eclipse of the sun. The eclipse will be visible -- weather permitting -- across North America. The entire continent will experience a partial eclipse lasting two to three hours. Anyone within a 70-milewide path that stretches through 14 states from Oregon to South Carolina will experience a total eclipse. During those brief moments -- when the moon completely blocks the sun's bright face for about two minutes -- day will turn into night, making visible the otherwise hidden solar corona, the sun's outer atmosphere. Bright stars and planets will become visible as well. Birds will fly to their nighttime roosts. Nocturnal insects such as cicadas and crickets will buzz and chirp. This is nature's wondrous trulv one of most experiences.

For NASA, the eclipse provides a unique opportunity to study the sun, Earth, moon and their interaction, because of the eclipse's long path over land coast to coast. Eleven NASA and NOAA satellites, the International Space Station, more than 50 high-altitude balloons, and hundreds of ground-based assets will take advantage of this rare event over 90 minutes, sharing the science and the beauty of a total solar eclipse with all. Via live streams and a NASA TV broadcast, NASA will bring the Aug. 21 eclipse live to viewers everywhere in the world.



Eclipse Fast Facts

- On Aug. 21, 2017, all of North America will view weather permitting -- a partial eclipse, when the moon obscures part of the sun.
- A total eclipse will be viewable throughout a 70-mile-wide path that crosses 14 of the United States from Oregon to South Carolina.
- The umbra (or dark inner shadow) of the moon will be traveling from west to east from almost 3,000 miles per hour (in western Oregon) to 1,500 miles per hour in South Carolina.
- The last total eclipse in the United States occurred on Feb. 26, 1979. The last total eclipse that crossed the entire continent occurred on June 8, 1918.
- The last time a total solar eclipse occurred exclusively in the U.S. was in 1778.
- Experiencing a total solar eclipse where you live happens on average about once in 375 years.
- 12.2 million Americans live in the path of the total eclipse.
 Of course, with visitors, that number will be much higher on Aug. 21!
- About 200 million people (a little less than 2/3 the nation's population) live within one day's drive of the path of this total eclipse. In addition, millions of Americans will be able to view a partial eclipse, weather permitting.
- The lunar shadow enters the West Coast at 9:05 a.m. PDT, and Lincoln City, Oregon will be the first place in the continental U.S. to see the total solar eclipse, beginning at 10:15 a.m. PDT.
- Charleston, South Carolina will be the last place in the continental U.S. to see the total solar eclipse, ending at 2:48 p.m. EDT.
- The lunar shadow will exit the East Coast of the U.S. at 4:09 p.m. EDT.
- Total solar eclipses offer unprecedented opportunities to study Earth under uncommon conditions. The sudden blocking of the sun during an eclipse reduces the sunlight energy that reaches the Earth. Scientists stationed in Columbia, Missouri and Casper, Wyoming will measure the radiant energy in the atmosphere from the ground and in space. Their goal is to improve our understanding of how the sun's radiant energy within the Earth's atmosphere changes when clouds, particles, or the moon block sunlight from reaching the Earth's surface.
- Scientists have made extensive atmospheric radiant energy measurements during eclipses before, but this is the first opportunity to have coordinated data from both the ground and from a spacecraft located 1 million miles (1.6 million kilometers) from Earth that can see the entire sunlit Earth during an eclipse.
- These quick-changing conditions can affect local weather and even animal behavior. For example, orb-weaving spiders were observed dismantling their webs during a 1991 eclipse in Mexico.

Eclipse Viewing Safety



The only safe way to look directly at an uneclipsed or partially eclipsed sun is through special purpose solar filters, such as eclipse glasses or handheld solar viewers. Homemade filters or ordinary sunglasses, even very dark ones, are NOT safe for looking at the sun. It is safe to look at a total eclipse with your naked eyes, ONLY during the brief period of totality, which will last just a minute or two during the Aug. 21 eclipse.

It is NOT safe to look at the sun through the viewfinder of a camera or an unfiltered telescope. You may, however, safely look at the screen of your smart phone or digital camera focused on the eclipse, though you are unlikely to get a good view. An alternative method for safe viewing of the partially eclipsed sun is pinhole projection. In this method, you don't look directly at the sun, but at a projection on a piece of paper or even the ground.

For example, cross the outstretched, slightly open fingers of one hand over the outstretched, slightly open fingers of the other. Do not look at your hands, but at the shadow of your hands on the ground. The little spaces between your fingers will project a grid of small images, showing the sun as a crescent during the partial phases of the eclipse. Eclipse Traveling Safety

The best advice for travelers planning to view the total solar eclipse is to plan well in advance. In fact, for many key viewing locations, it may already be too late to make a lodging or camping reservation. So you may have to get creative and plan to stay with family or friends.

The Federal Highway administration calls this a "planned special event for which there has been no recent precedent in the United States." There may well be intense traffic both before and after the eclipse along the path of totality. Viewers should attempt to get to their viewing spot well ahead of time — a day or more in advance if possible. Travelers should make sure to bring food and water, and determine how to access a bathroom if they need wait out the traffic when they leave.

NASA Eclipse Science - Overview

"This is the first eclipse in almost 100 years that's covering the entire country and that's going to be a game changer for eclipse science – both for studying the sun and what's happening here on Earth. Sports-viewing was essentially revolutionized by having cameras that could follow a player from start to finish. That's a little like what scientists can do during this eclipse. We can't send a camera in real time to follow the eclipse shadow – it travels at 1,500 miles an hour -- but we can line up cameras or sensors or, in this case, balloons. We then turn those many observations into one giant observation that lasts for roughly an hour and a half." – Alex Young, Solar Scientist, NASA's Goddard Space Flight Center

The path of the total eclipse will provide a unique opportunity for NASA and other scientists to study the sun, moon, Earth, and their interaction. Weather permitting, other planets and astronomical phenomena will be visible. With its long path over land, this total eclipse provides unprecedented research opportunities: NASA funds balloons, ground measurements, and planes that "chase" the eclipse. Scientists can take continuous measurements of the sun and the eclipse's effects on Earth for relatively long periods of time. Several NASA missions in space will observe the event. This includes astronauts aboard the International Space Station; NASA's Lunar Reconnaissance Orbiter, which will turn its instruments to face Earth and attempt to track the shadow of the moon on our planet; a host of Earth-observing spacecraft, which can both observe the shadow of the moon and measure how the dip in sunlight affects plants and the heating of the planet; and a fleet of solar observing spacecraft observing a partial eclipse.



Plan Your Fall Garden

From the Urban Farmer:

August is an ideal time to plant seeds for a second gardening season that can be as productive as your major early spring plantings. Late summer is the time to plant these vegetables and herbs.



Beans:

Start planting both bush and pole beans now that the soil and air are warmed up. Try a continual 7-10 day sowing of different varieties. This will give you continual bean crops and not one large harvest with wasted crop. Early August is the last practical sowing date.

Cucumbers

Fast growing vine or bush cucumber plants can produce an abundance of cucumber fruits. Be careful to pick a variety for the space you have in your garden. Vine cucumbers can be the best tasting but need far more space than bush varieties.

Kale

Planting kale mid-July through mid-August will yield an excellent harvest in the fall and winter.

Lettuce

Sow lettuce in August for a fall crop. Try growing early harvest varieties that will produce a harvest before cold weather rolls in.

Peas

Green peas and sugar peas are good to plant in August, and will produce a moderate fall harvest.

Radish

A quick and easy vegetable to grow. Plant now and you can have them ready in 30 days.

Spinach

Spinach is more of a cool weather vegetable and is great to grow in August.



Homemade Garden Salsa for Canning

Ingredients:

25 or 26 lbs. tomatoes, peeled and chopped 2 bunches celery, chopped 9 lg. onions, chopped Jalapenos to taste

2 – 3 c. white vinegar

1 cluster of garlic, peeled and chopped 6 lg. bell peppers, chopped

2 bunches cilantro, chopped

½ c. salt

2 tbsp. oregano

Directions:

- ❖ Boil tomatoes to remove skin; begin by placing tomatoes in boiled water for 1 − 2 minutes, watch the skins while boiling and when they begin to burst open remove from the water and place in ice water immediately; allow the tomatoes to cool down for a few minutes before removing skins. They should easily peel off leaving the inside meat.
- Chop the tomatoes into quarters or eighths and begin removing seeds. Once the seeds are removed start dicing the tomatoes into small bite size pieces.
- Chop onions, peppers, garlic and cilantro as fine or as chunky as you like.
- Boil all ingredients together in a large pot. Turn Stove to medium and allow the salsa to begin to bubble. Be sure to stir the salsa every few minutes for even cooking. Taste ingredients and add more pepper for spice. Start slow so you don't overdo it.
- If using the ingredients stated above, you will need at least 8-pint size jars. Be sure to run the jars through the dishwasher before placing ingredients inside. For a tight seal, be sure to boil the lids and lid rings before closing salsa inside jars.
- Let cool and store or share with friends! Enjoy!


