National Day of Prayer Theme for 2018

The National Day of Prayer was created in 1952 by a joint resolution of Congress, and signed into law by President Harry S. Truman. In 1988, the law was unanimously amended by both the House and the Senate and signed into law by President Ronald Reagan on Thursday, May 5, 1988, designating the first Thursday of May as a day of national prayer. Every president since 1952 has signed a National Day of Prayer proclamation.

Prayer reminds us that we are created in God's image and He desires for us to represent Him everywhere we go. Prayer brings UNITY. May is Historic Preservation Month

At the April 23 Council Meeting, Vienna Mayor and City Council adopted a proclamation designating May 2018 as Historic Preservation Month in Vienna. Since 1973, communities across America have taken this opportunity to showcase their historic properties and raise awareness about the benefits and importance of historic preservation.

This year, the Vienna Historic Preservation Commission is showcasing the Vienna Cultural Center as a place that matters.

The quaint frame building was originally the Prince of Peace Episcopal Church constructed and organized in 1903. Charter members of the Church were Colonel M. P. Hall, R. S. Middleton, W. J. Bullock, W. M. Turton, and Miss Bertha Leonard. The vicar came from Americus once a month to hold services. The congregation disbanded in the early 1940s.

In the 1950s and 60s the building was used as a kindergarten where Aunt Janie Forehand held classes for many years. After the kindergarten closed, the structure fell into a state of near ruin and was scheduled to be burned by the local fire department.

The Vienna Historic Preservation Society rescued the building and restored it back to its original grandeur. The Vienna Cultural Center is now used for small community functions.

Dooly County High School Students Complete Vienna Leadership 101

Thirty Dooly County High School students in Ms. Deborah Heckwolf's AP class recently completed Vienna Leadership 101, a community leadership training class. Community Development Director, Janet Joiner said, "The overall goals of the class are to make local government more accessible to everyone and to produce productive and engaged citizens for the future. Often our youth feel disconnected from the community outside of school life, so we hope this class will help them be more knowledgeable about their community and instill a desire in them to be engaged in the community."

The course consisted of 4 sessions. Topics discussed were the history of Vienna/Dooly County, the organizational structure of the City of Vienna, law enforcement and how to communicate with officers, the importance of litter control and the fact that littering is a crime, five qualities of a good leader, and volunteer opportunities with the City of Vienna.

As a class project, the group participated in the "Keep Vienna Clean as a Whistle City-wide Cleanup" by adopting a mile of 41 Highway in front of the school. At the end of the fourth session, Mayor Hobby Stripling passed out Certificates of Completion to 29 students.

Tips for reducing, recycling, and disposing of hazardous materials: Automobile

- Never dump vehicle fluids on the pavement, the ground or down the storm drain.
 Collect and recycle motor oil, oil filters and other automobile fluids at vehicle service centers or parts stores listed on 1-800-CLEANUP and www.cleanup.org.
- Wash your vehicle at a professional car wash facility. This way the wastewater will be treated instead of possibly becoming a pollutant in a nearby stream. If you decide to wash your car at home, use a low or non-phosphate soap and wash your vehicle in a grassy area instead of on pavement.
- Regularly tune your car and fix leaks.
